SUITCASE OR BACKPACK?

The Ultimate question every backpacker asks themselves before they go travelling... "Should I take a suitcase or a backpack?"

So which option is right for you? There are a few things to take into account when deciding:

Will you be travelling around a lot?

Are you planning on settling in one place for the majority of your time to live and work?

Are you heading to Southeast Asia or other not so developed destinations?

It can be a tricky decision to make, as the majority of people don't know exactly what they'll be doing during their gap year: that's the whole idea right!? So to help you make your decision, here's a list of options and pros & cons so you can decide for yourself:

NOTE: Every Ultimate tour has a baggage limit of 20kg plus a 7kg carry on.

The 'Trusty' Suitcase:

Pros:

Wheels – Who would have thought such a simple invention could bring you so much happiness!? As you'll be rolling your things around, you won't suffer from the dreaded backpacker back aches or back sweats. You can access your clothes and belongings easily and quickly and relax happy in the knowledge that your padlock is keeping your stuff safe and secure!

Cons:

Stairs will be your enemy. Those 'backpack' w*nk*rs you were laughing at earlier won't seem so silly after you've dragged your suitcase up to the 5th floor of your hostel. Suitcases aren't ideal for travelling to places such as the Red Centre, Northern Territory or Western Australia either. Also, as suitcases are normally heavier, you may find yourself having to monitor your flight allowances more!

The 'Iconic' Backpack:

Pros:

They now come in front or top loaders and can also have wheels (are you just trying to be a suitcase??). Backpacks are normally durable and can be thrown around a bit – perfect for boat trips through Southeast Asian islands and other 'off the beaten track' tours. Backpacks fit a lot in, can be squashed into small spaces and let's not forget.. backpacks make a great pillow for those nights you'll spend sleeping at the airport!

Cons:

If you pack too much, backpacks can be really heavy which means carrying it for longer than 5 minutes at a time and you'll need to see a masseuse. Sweaty back, now no one likes that. It could take your 4 friends, a step ladder and the legs of a bodybuilder to lift the backpack up to your back.

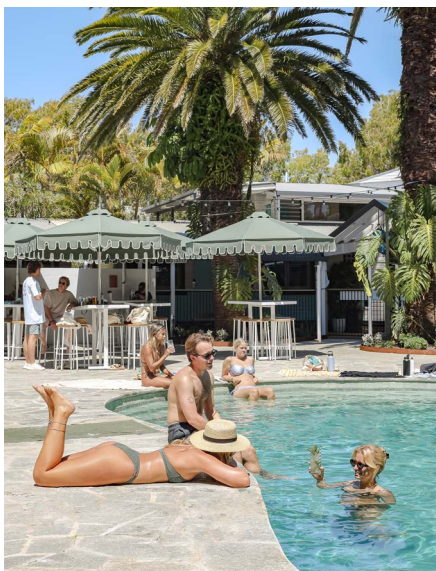


HOSTEL LIFE WHAT TO EXPECT



In Australia, you can definitely get the best and worst of both worlds when it comes to hostels. While we can't speak for them all, we can definitely let you in on all the details about the hostels we use in Australia. We select the best in the area you are staying in terms of an overall standing of cleanliness, location, availability and social activities. Here are some pointers to be prepared for:

- **6-12 bed shared bunk dormitories** (private upgrades are available)
- **No curtains** on your bunk beds like Southeast Asia but some beds are built to optimise privacy and you can always hang a towel or sheet
- **Communal bathrooms** - its a given. Some will have an ensuite in your room to share but some will have shared hostel bathrooms. Be prepared with flip flops to wear in the shower and a toiletry bag with a hook
- **Free food!** Some hostels put on social events like BBQ and nacho nights, but never assume its a full meal, they are feeding a whole hostel for free, have a bite and make the most of the social vibes
- A lot of the hostels we use along the East Coast of Australia have **swimming pools!** Enjoy!
- **Aircon** - Australia can be HOT. Most hostels will have aircon (or fans at the very least) but are often set on timers to save the environment. If there is ever an issue just have a chat to the friendly hostel staff
- **Alcohol** - if a hostel is licenced (meaning they have a bar or sell alcohol) you cannot bring in your own alcohol to drink, always respect their drinking rules to avoid any issues
- You will be sharing a room with others so always be prepared for **snorers/people coming in late**, with ear plugs and an eyemask. It's all part of the experience
- **Cleanliness** - there's nothing worse then going to cook in a kitchen and someone has left a mess, clean up after yourself as you go and hopefully everyone else will do the same. If they don't, chat to the staff and they are always more than happy to help
- **Check in** is always between 2-3pm and **check out** between 10-11am. There's always space to store your bags and a bathroom to



AUSTRALIAN WEATHER

WHAT'S THE BEST TIME OF YEAR TO TRAVEL AUSTRALIA?

Honestly, there's no bad time to visit Australia—just different vibes depending on when you come! Australia is a huge country, so the weather varies wildly depending on where you are.

Summer (Dec–Feb): Think long, sunny beach days, buzzing cities, and balmy nights. However, in tropical regions (like Cairns and the Whitsundays), it's the wet season, so expect a mix of rain and humidity. Don't worry—there's still plenty to do, and who doesn't love a tropical rainstorm?

Autumn (Mar–May): A sweet spot! The East Coast is cooler but still warm enough for the beach, with fewer crowds.

Winter (Jun–Aug): Yes, it's winter, but it's not as chilly as you'd think—especially on the East Coast. Queensland is still pretty warm, and the southern cities like Sydney and Melbourne have their own cozy charm (hello, rooftop hot chocolates and plenty of Winter activities). Plus, it's whale season, and who doesn't love spotting whales while cruising the coast?

Spring (Sep–Nov): Beaches, festivals, and sunshine! Everything's in full bloom, making it one of the most popular times to visit.

Our group tours run all year, so you can expect a good time no matter when you join. We'll help you make the most of the season, whether that's hitting the beach or finding the best indoor fun if the weather decides to play up.

Is It Still Good to Travel the East Coast in Winter?

Absolutely! Australia's winter isn't exactly the frosty affair you might imagine. On the East Coast, winter means mild, pleasant days perfect for exploring. Think sunny beach weather up north in Queensland (around 25°C most days!) and crisp, cool mornings further south. Pack a light jacket for evenings, but don't stress about snow boots—unless you're hitting up the ski fields (yes, we have those too).

Whale watching season! You'll get to see these majestic creatures migrate up and down the coast.

AUSTRALIA INFO

MONEY

In Australia there is no need to tip, it is never expected. Nearly everywhere will accept card but it is a good idea to always have cash for smaller things to avoid minimum eftpos charges. How much money you need in Australia depends on how long you want to stay and the experiences you want to have. As a general average we recommend \$80-\$100AUD a day for meals.



THE SNAKES, THE SPIDERS, THE DROP BEARS, OH MY

Australia may have over 2000 species of spiders and 20 of the 25 most venomous snakes in the world but they are extremely misunderstood. Quite frankly they want nothing to do with you and if you leave them be they will leave you be. The most common spiders you will see, though very ugly, are completely harmless and you'd would be lucky to actually spot a snake in the wild. Now the drop bears are a different story, watch out for those buggers.

AUSSIE CULTURE

Get ready to see people walking barefoot in the supermarkets, the constant swearing as terms of endearment and strangers walking past you and asking 'How ya going?' In Australia they walk on the left side and it's pretty normal for everyone to be at the pub for 'happy hour' every weekday (cheap drinks usually between 4pm-5pm).

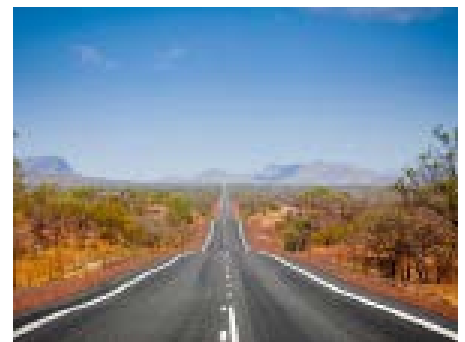


ILLEGAL ACTIVITIES

Jaywalking is illegal in Australia, crazy right! It is rare but you can be hit with a fine if you get caught jaywalking, especially in a major city, so wait for the little green man and the weird sound you'll come to appreciate. Public drinking is also illegal. Drinking age is 18 + and you can only buy alcohol from a liquorshop or licenced venue.

TRAVEL

'Down the road' in Australia can often mean a 3 hour road trip to the next house, so be warned. Australia is a massive country so be prepared for a lot of travel but we promise it's worth it! Public transport is CHEAP as chips and pretty easy to navigate in all major cities. Learn to enjoy the art of roadtripping and always book flights as far in advance as possible.



AUSTRALIAN INDIGENOUS HISTORY

Australia is regarded as a fairly young country on the world stage, only having reached nationhood status in 1901. But the Indigenous people of Australia have been here for over 60,000 years, making the Aboriginal culture the oldest surviving in the world. Australia is only a 'young country' in terms of European settlement.

The Aboriginal belief system or 'religion' is Dreamtime. It's their way of understanding the world and the relationship of things and rules governing their lives. Aboriginals believe that their ancestors emerged from below the earth to form nature, including the sky, water bodies, and animal species. Unlike other religions, the Aboriginals do not put humans on a level higher than nature. They believe that some of their ancestors changed into nature, where they are still spiritually alive.

When they first had contact with European people in the 1770's they were shocked by their white skin that they believed they were spirits of their ancestors, but in reality they were invaders. This was soon realised when white settlers started poisoning and slaughtering Aboriginal people and destroying them systematically.

From the early 1900's white men would take Aboriginal children, mostly with lighter skin (half-casts) and place them in schools where they were taught to be 'white'. Europeans believed that the Indigenous should 'die out' through a process of natural elimination. Children taken from their parents were forced to adapt to white culture and reject their heritage in every way. White society refused to accept Aboriginal people as equals in Australia.

When the British settled in Australia they claimed it to be Terra Nullius (empty land that now belongs to the king). It wasn't until 1976 when land rights were given back to tribes and in 1992 they declared Terra Nullius was wrong and Aboriginals could claim native land title. On the 13th of February 2008, the then Prime Minister said sorry to the Stolen Generation. This apology was an important step in the reconciliation process



The very foundation of their unique culture lies in the respect they have for the land and their elders. Becoming an elder requires a lifetime of working for the community; age alone is not a contributing factor. An Elder is someone who has gained recognition as a custodian of knowledge and lore, and who has permission to disclose knowledge and beliefs (Dreamtime).

The Aboriginal Flag was designed in the 1970s and its colours represent different aspects of Aboriginal life. The black symbolises Aboriginal people, the yellow represents the sun and the red represents the earth and the relationship between people and the land.

Despite their rich history, Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islanders face many challenges today. They experience widespread inequality, discrimination and cultural disconnection as a result of complex policies and systems in Australia that have limited their voices from being heard in decision-making processes that impact on their lives, although it is slowly getting better.

Many native animal names are derived from traditional Aboriginal language, including bilby, kangaroo, wallaby, barramundi, koala, wombat and kookaburra. Other words include billabong, boomerang and yakka.

There are thousands of ancient rock art sites throughout Australia depicting animals, food, symbols and stories. The Aboriginal rock art in Western Australia's Dampier Archipelago is believed to be at least twice as old as the pyramids of Egypt.

Many Australian places are going back to their true Aboriginal name like Uluru and K'gari.



BEFORE YOUR ULTIMATE TOUR

BOOKING

Once you book your ULTIMATE tour, your final payment will be due 45 days before your tour start date. An automatic reminder will be sent to you to complete the payment. If you booked open-dated, make sure you email to let us know when you have decided your chosen departure date. To enter Australia you must have a valid VISA (page 7 for more information) and to travel on an ULTIMATE tour you must have travel insurance. We recommend comprehensive cover with World Nomads but always shop around and find one that is right for you!

MEETING OTHER TRAVELLERS

Travelling solo? Great! Most of the people you meet on tour will also be on a solo adventure! If you are curious as to who you could be travelling with or want to make some friends before arriving, join our Travel Community on Facebook and reach out to your potential new travel mates! Join the conversation [here](#). Information about other travellers on your tour cannot be disclosed by Ultimate Travel prior to your tour starting. Tour sizes range from 6-24 and have an age range of 18-35.

PLAN YOUR ARRIVAL

If you haven't already let us know your flight details and you are arriving to Sydney Airport then send us an email to res@ultimate.travel so we can arrange your arrival transfer. We offer a free transfer to the hostel in Sydney before your tour starts. If your flight is delayed don't stress, the shuttles run every 45 minutes until 11pm so you can always grab the next one. If you will be delayed by over 24 hours please get in touch with the Ultimate office. (Please note airport transfers are not included for tours starting in Melbourne). A week before your tour you will be sent all the information regarding your transfer and tour meeting point, time and Group Leader info.

PACKING CHECKS

Aside from packing 100 swimsuits and 700 pairs of underwear there's a few things you should double check as well. That your passport is still valid for at least the next 6 months, you have any medication prescriptions that you may require and that you have emergency copies printed off of your passport, visa, travel insurance and emergency contact list. Australia does not require you to have any kind of vaccinations to enter the country.

STRESS LESS

We know travelling to a new country can be scary and although we can't travel with you on the plane, know that when you arrive in Sydney we will be here for you. Not just for all your travel and working holiday needs but even just a friendly ear or a shoulder to cry on. Our staff are always keen to give their recommendations and advice from their own experiences with travelling or taking a gap year down under.

WHAT TO EXPECT

GROUP LEADER

On your tour you will always have a Group Leader. They're there to make sure you get from A to B, get to do all the activities you want to do and provide their expert knowledge on the East Coast of Australia. They are the first point of contact for you and will help you out with everything. on tour.

MEALS

On tour you will have some included meals. Make sure you let your Group Leader on Day 1 know of any dietary requirements. In most cases, we can cater to Vegetarian and Gluten Free diets. We will make every effort to cater to all other diets and needs, but we are unable to guarantee this will be possible in every location we visit. Unfortunately, we can not cater for tastes or dislikes.

SPENDING MONEY

On our Group Tours, your transport and accommodation along with the meals and activities listed on the itinerary are all included in your tour price. While you are travelling you may wish to participate in additional activities which you will need to budget for. While travelling you may wish to eat and drink out or you may plan to cook and prepare some of your own meals. As a guide, we recommend you budget an additional \$80 - \$100AUD per day for spending money.

TRANSPORT

We travel from Sydney to Cairns via public transport, train and coaches. Our point to point transport feature air-conditioning, reclining seats, Wifi, in-seat USB chargers, and onboard toilets. We travel a whopping 2,420.2 km between Sydney and Cairns and to make the most of our time in each location some of those journeys will be an overnight coach. Remember Australia is a big country, so sit back, relax and enjoy the scenery.

SOCIAL

Travelling on a group tour is one of the best experiences you will have but in some cases you may not get along with everyone. But that is totally fine because there will always be other travellers on the tour to hang out with. Ultimate have a zero tolerance policy when it comes to bullying. You're travelling Australia! There is no need for any negativity.

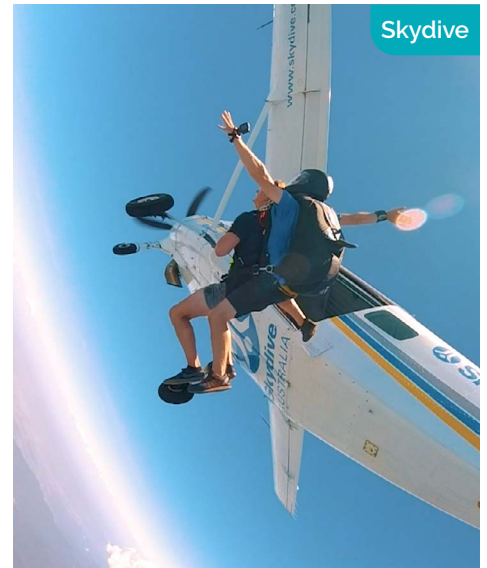
